

Testimony Betsy Gara Executive Director Connecticut Council of Small Towns Before the Labor Committee February 27, 2024

The Connecticut Council of Small Towns (COST) urges you to <u>oppose</u> HB-5264, AN ACT CONCERNING VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENTS AND AMBULANCE COMPANIES AND THE DEFINITION OF EMPLOYER UNDER THE CONNECTICUT OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH ACT.

HB-5264 imposes another layer of costly regulation on volunteer fire departments and ambulance companies. These volunteer organizations are vital to protecting public health and safety in our small communities.

Several years ago, the CT Supreme Court held that private employers, including volunteer fire departments and ambulance companies, are not subject to state OSHA laws but, instead, must comply with federal OSHA laws. By effectively overturning this decision, HB-5264 would subject volunteer fire departments and volunteer ambulance companies to an additional unnecessary and duplicative layer of regulation.

Volunteer fire departments and ambulance companies are struggling to maintain services during very difficult economic times. Adding another layer of bureaucracy to the operation of such volunteer organizations will make it difficult for them to provide critical public safety and first responder services in their communities.

COST urges you to reject this bill.
